

# Reflection by Fr. Michael Warren, OMV

February is the month dedicated to the Holy Family

The love and commitment of marriage and family life is renewed each day. When couples exchange their vows they embark on a lifelong journey to holiness that is re-expressed each day and in each action. The love that is exchanged on the wedding day must be made concrete every day in every part of daily life shared by the couple. This is how the grace of the marriage sacrament transforms the lives of husband and wife. Every day presents new moments for grace to penetrate their individual lives. The transformational graces of marriage do not happen in one moment at the altar when vows are exchanged; rather, that is the launching point for a life of dedicated service to each other.

However, no merely human love can ever be enough to complete another human being. We are made for the love of God. It is His love for us and our response to Him that is the fulfillment of all desire. Even married couples will never be able to be the absolute fulfillment for each other. They minister to each other in growing in the love of God, which is their perfection. Spouses show each other a kind of mercy when they do not expect from each other total completion. The spouses need each other. They need to pray with and for each other, but they also need their own personal relationship with God in order to live out their commitment to each other and to grow in personal freedom. Fulfilling the marriage covenant will require an individual and personal commitment to God, then to each other.

Nevertheless, family prayer is essential spirituality. At the heart of each family spirituality should be the Sunday Eucharist, a true family pilgrimage to the parish church. The family rosary, prayers before bed and domestic celebrations of feast days are also great means by which to keep the grace of the marriage sacrament stirring.

As the family members grow in mutual love, reflecting the love of God for them and in them, they are also called to a social love outside of the family. Love is never meant to be constrained; it is meant to reach beyond its origin out to peripheries. Family love begins at home but is then meant to reach to neighbors, local parishes, schools, colleagues at work and other friends. In this way the family truly becomes an icon of the creative love of the Blessed Trinity. 6



The Vatican office in charge of coordinating plans for the Holy Year 2025 announced they are launching a new website and releasing an app to help people register and to guide them along their pilgrimage in Rome.

By registering online at iubi-

laeum2025.va or on the jubilee app, people will receive a free digital "pilgrim's card," which will be needed to participate in jubilee events, especially gaining access to the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica, said Msgr. Graham Bell, undersecretary of the Dicastery for Evangelization's section that is coordinating the Holy Year.

The jubilee website was to go live May 10 and be available in nine languages, he said at a news conference at the Vatican May 9. People can begin registering online starting in September, he said, "by clicking on the 'participate' button." After registering, people will be able to access a personal page on the site's "pilgrim's zone," which will also go live in September.

Registrants will receive a digital "pilgrim's card," which is a personal OR code needed to access jubilee events and better facilitate the pilgrimage to the Holy Door, the monsignor said. There also will be an option to purchase a "service card" for a nominal fee to receive special discounts for transportation, lodging, food and museums during the pilgrimage.

The jubilee website and app will give news and information on the Holy Door of St. Peter's and the other basilicas as well as offer the possibility of organizing one's own pilgrimage within the city, Msgr. Bell said.

People can choose from three proposed pilgrimages: "the traditional pilgrimage of St. Philip Neri with the seven churches; the pilgrimage on the churches dedicated to the women doctors of the church and patrons of Europe; and the 'Iter Europaeum,' that is, the 28 churches in 27 different European countries, plus the church that represents the European Union."

# Eucharistic Mini-Pilgrimages: How to Plan One this Summer

ONE OF THE LARGEST EUCHARISTIC PILGRIMAGES
IN HISTORY

As we enter the Year of Parish Revival, we are preparing for one of the largest Eucharistic pilgrimages in history here in the United States. For two months, women and men will process with the Eucharist across the country, lighting hearts on fire with hope and joy along the way. This demonstration of faith in the Eucharist will take place from May 17 (the weekend of Pentecost) to July 16, 2024. Commencing from four starting points, Brownsville, TX; Lake Itasca, MN; New Haven, CT; and San Francisco, CA, pilgrims will process with our Eucharistic Lord through cities, along highways. and past rural towns, meeting in Indianapolis just before the National Eucharistic Congress. Along the way, they will be praying, seeking new depths of transformation in Jesus, serving those on the margins, and witnessing to their faith in the Risen Jesus. I would love to travel with the Eucharist across the country and to witness the marvels of grace that Jesus will pour out upon our nation during this prayerful journey. However, I know right now that I won't be able to be part of the National Pilgrimage. Probably many of you won't be able to join this amazing Eucharistic event either. Yet all of us are invited to grow in love for Jesus in the Eucharist and to share our faith as missionary disciples. This summer, why not go on your own Eucharistic pilgrimage right where you live to deepen your Eucharistic faith and devotion?

On a local pilgrimage, you can explore the holy places in your own diocese, state, town, or even your own parish, adoring the Eucharistic presence of Jesus Christ anew and participating in Mass in your own backyard.

Are you going on vacation this summer? Locate a shrine or a church along the way where you can pray before the Eucharist. You might even research if there is a church where an American saint is buried near where you will be. The Archdiocese of Denver has designated seven churches as pilgrimage sites for the Eucharistic Revival, and your diocese may be doing something similar. Even if you are homebound or ill, you can make a "spiritual pilgrimage" right where you are. eucharisticpilgrimage.org
