

wo years ago we made vocations the #1 priority for our entire province. We put together a committee of nine men and drafted a vocation plan for the entire province over a period of six months. The lofty goal of 10 vocations a year was agreed upon, and everyone set about doing their part to drum up vocations.

The first step was to pray and ask God for the grace of 10 vocations a year. We created the St. Joseph Society to help pray for vocations, and so many of you now join us in daily prayer!

The first year we got two new vocations which was not disappointing because plans usually take five years to be realized. This year, we welcome two new vocations to Our

Lady of Grace Seminary in Boston (Zach and Xavier). Three men from Nigeria entered our seminary for advanced studies in Manila, and four men from Sri Lanka entered our seminary as aspirants in Cebu in the Philippines.

On top of that, out of the blue, a former Oblate whose path separated him from us thirty years ago asked if he could rejoin. He will arrive at the end of February to enter community life.

The goal was 10 new vocations a year. This year we have 10 men entering the Oblates of the Virgin Mary from places and circumstances I never imagined!

It's funny how God answers our prayers, so keep praying and keep looking for God to answer prayers in unexpected ways.

#### **PRIESTHOOD REFLECTION**

FR. JONATHON HANK OMV **OBLATE PRIEST** 



s I settle into my new identity as a priest, and my new assignment at Holy Ghost, I wanted to share with all of you a little of what's been on my heart.

The two weeks surrounding my ordination were quite intense, leading me through something of an emotional rollercoaster. Before I left for California, Fr. John Paul OMV and I gave last rites to my grandmother, Lucy Hank; she passed away six days later, and I celebrated the funeral Mass after returning to Denver. During this same span of time, I was preparing for my Ordination, enjoying some leisure time with family and friends in the wonderful California weather, receiving the gift of the priesthood in a beautiful and moving liturgy, offering numerous first blessings, and hearing countless congratulations. Since returning to Holy Ghost, I've had the consolations of celebrating Masses and of hearing confessions, as well as the challenge of beginning to figure out what a parochial vicar is actually supposed to do.

Sorrow, joy, sorrow, joy... the cycle of the priest's life has been tiring, but incredibly rewarding. It reminds me of the words of Venerable Fulton Sheen: "The priest is not his own." No one becomes a priest for his own sake, but rather for the sake of those he will eventually serve. The priest is called to be bread, to be himself the sacrifice that he celebrates whenever he says the words: This is my body; this is my blood.

There is a gift here, a total self-gift. It is a gift that encompasses all the joys and sorrows, all the challenges and consolations of life, and chooses to offer itself as metaphorical food.

I have experienced this in a particular way in the sacrament of Reconciliation, feeling the fire of mercy radiating from Jesus's heart as I pronounce the words of absolution over each penitent. I have also been able to experience the Mass in a new way, beginning with the Penitential Act, in which I recognize the vast difference between my own weakness and the greatness of what the Lord is doing through me as I consecrate the Eucharist.

To be honest, all this is still a little frightening and overwhelming. As a "baby priest" (as many have taken to calling me) there is still so much I haven't experienced of this vocation: so much joy, so much sorrow, so many failures, so many victories. I don't know all of what my "Yes" will entail. But I desire, with the help of God, to be food: to live that total generosity of spirit, in imitation of Jesus's Eucharistic Heart.

Thank you for all your support and prayers over these last several years as I have been preparing for priestly ordination. Please pray for me for the grace to live out this vocation to the full, and I will be praying for all of you!

**PHILIPPINES VOCATION UPDATE** 

## **Opening Doors To A New** Generation

oon after we opened our first formation house in the Philippines, our seminary was bursting at the seams.

Today, the OMVs have two locations in the Philippines: Antipolo, in the North (just outside Metro Manila) and Cebu in the Central Islands. Despite minor setbacks and growing pains of quick expansion, things were going well. Then Covid hit...

Since then, it seems that every diocese and religious community in Christendom lost vocation prospects.

In the aftermath, we recognized an even bigger challenge: the academic readiness of candidates - especially their English language skills. Sadly, fewer and fewer candidates have the necessary ability to read, write, take notes, and do research in English at a college level. With the decline in vocations and the real need for English language skills, we've expanded our mission in the Philippines to include preseminary education.

For the first time, we're offering an Aspirancy Program. Men with or without college experience as well as those eager for college preparation with an eye toward seminary admission can come and live in community, study fundamental academic topics (especially English), learn the life of prayer, and take their first courses in Theology, Church History, Spirituality and Scripture.

This shift is timely and advantageous for us and the Church. More than ever men and women desirous of a vocation are coming from Southeast Asia to the Philippines. In fact, it's said that regarding religious studies, Manila is the "Rome of the East."

We're about to enter another academic year, and God's lavish providence has gifted

us with seven new candidates between our two houses of formation. That's a real boon to our newly adopted Aspirancy Program.

As we labor for the future, we celebrate our growth today! Soon we will ordain two new priests from our formation program here. In December, Provincial Rector Father Jim Walther OMV and Vocation Director Father Paul Kallal OMV will join us in the Philippines for the priestly ordination of Dcn. Mannie Martinez Beltran OMV and Dcn. Jake Inot Villorejo OMV!

Please keep us in your prayers, especially Dcn. Mannie and Dcn. Jake as they begin their priestly ministry.
